
OF NOTE: The bell at the church was salvaged from the original belltower,

THE CONGREGATION: The church opened in 1871 as a mission. The first chapel was built in 1875, served by priests from Our Lady of the Holy Cross parish and the former Our Lady of Mount Carmel in the Baden neighborhood of St. Louis. The parish's first pastor, the Rev. Martin Bahr, was appointed

in 1908. The rectory was built that year with \$2,000 collected by parishioners. The current church was built in 1955.

In the 1950s, the church's elementary school had more than 500 students. In 1959, the parish's growth led the St. Louis archbishop to form a second church, Our Lady of Loretto. For years, the church held annual Labor Day picnics, which later became annual autumn festivals that featured themed parades, carnival rides, music and fried-chicken dinners.

When the church closes, its parishioners will attend Our Lady of the Holy Rosary in the Our Lady of Loretto parish, 11725 Bellefontaine Road.
